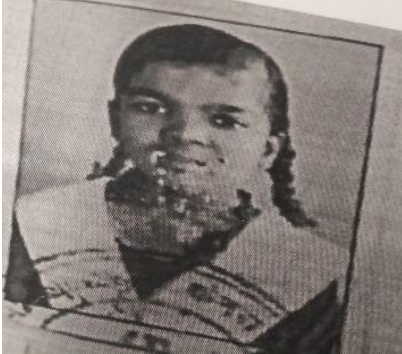
Activity Report 2025-2026

Registered under the Societies Registration Act 1860, on 30th November 1991 in Nagpur, bearing Registration No. 410/91 and the Trust Act 1950 on 28th January 1992 with Trust Registration No. F.9536/Nag, having our roots in Nagpur, our mission knows no borders. We possess full nationwide jurisdiction to serve wherever the need is greatest.

The Society's social outreach initiatives are strategically organized into three pillars of development: Education, Healthcare, and Social Empowerment. During the 2025–2026 fiscal year, we have significantly scaled our operations to drive sustainable change in these key sectors.

These area where we are is under develop and slowly people are becoming aware of the importance of Education. They believe that all round development can get only through education. For this we have well qualified and trained teachers.

classes from LKG- V and IX- XII. Total strength in the school 520. Comparing to other years this new academic year more in numbers. We are 18 staff in the school. In the higher secondary there are three faculties- Arts, Science and Maths. All teachers are trained and well qualified. Due to poor background many students are unable to pay the fees. Most of the students after admitting in the school they don't pay and others only half. Therefore teachers were not getting required payments in time.



Many teachers are from other District teaching in the school. Some reside in the campus, others in the rented house and few local teachers. All are working hard for their livelihood and to shape and mold the students and make better future.

St. Joseph's Kidsland English Medium School, Kittur, is a pre- primary educational institution committed to providing quality education to children in the early years of learning. The school offers education for Nursery, L.K.G and U.K.G children. We have four teaching staff, two non- teaching staff and one school bus driver. Our focus is on the holistic development of every child through activity- based learning, language development, creative arts, physical activities, moral

education and value formation.

The dedicated teaching staff works tirelessly to provide individual attention to every child, ensuring that each student develops confidence, communication skills, creativity, and good character.

Despite our sincere efforts to maintain quality education, the school faces serious financial challenges. Being a small institution serving local families, many parents

come from economically weaker backgrounds and cannot afford high tuition fees. The school strives to keep fees affordable so that every child has access to quality education.

The limited income generated from fees is insufficient to meet the recurring expenses of the school, especially the payment of teacher's salaries.

SOCIAL EMPOWERMENT:

DISTRIBUTION OF FOOD KITS

Food kits were distributed in Nagpur to poor and needy families, widows, and elderly persons to support them in meeting their daily nutritional needs. Each kit contained rice, pulses (dal), cooking oil, and other essential food items sufficient for a family. Through this initiative, twelve families received timely assistance, helping to reduce their financial burden and ensuring access to basic necessities. The distribution brought much-needed relief and demonstrated care and solidarity with the most vulnerable members of the community.



OUTREACH PROGRAMME- I

The staff of Jeevandhara Society has visited the poor children, in Juni Mangalwari area of Nagpur. The aim of this visit was to combat Human trafficking and supporting victims of sexual exploitation. At present there are 34 children, they are provided education & vocational training to enable them for their stable future. Units of Jeevandhara staff contributed different items like, pencil boxes, pouches, refreshments, school bags, etc.

Different activities with these children are organised like games, singing, dancing etc...and gave them gifts.



OUTREACH PROGRAMME- II

On 20 September 2025, a charity programme was conducted at Yuvajyoti, a shelter home for thirty-five boys. During the visit, refreshments such as samosas and soft drinks were distributed to all the children. The programme provided an opportunity to interact with the boys, share moments of joy, and express care and support for their well-being.

Tailoring/ fashion designs:

Tailoring/ fashion design training is on progress. Till now 12 candidates have registered their names and attending the classes regularly. The classes are held from 12. 30 p.m. to 4.00 p.m., from Monday to Saturday. Mrs. Poonam Sachin Sonawane has been appointed as a teacher to teach them. Women are learning well. They are proving with their performance that learning has no age limit. They are enthusiastic and energetic to learn. The stitching tools are provided at the centre with discount amount that's availed by the learners.



Multipurpose Liquid soap:

The liquid soap training and demonstration was given by the coordinator to the groups. Women have learnt to make it simply. The kits are purchased in bulk and provided at the main centre. As per need women purchase either readymade liquid soap or raw

material and prepare in their homes. It's so useful and very effective for the multipurpose use. Ex. For Floor, toilets, utensils, car etc. women themselves



use them and found good results.



Livelihood (Machines)



The machines are given to the SHG women of Sakur village. It is kept in one of the women's house that is convenience for everyone. The machines are used by the SHG women to meet their daily needs and also for the income. The SHG women are charged half of the market price on the use of machines for the daily purpose. If any women who do not belong to the SHG use the machines, for any requirement has to pay market price. Women are doing well and happy to have such access in



their houses.

SOCIAL WORK PROGRAMMES



The Social Work Programmes were organized various gatherings for women with the aim of empowering them and increasing their awareness of their rights and responsibilities. The programmes included discussions, awareness sessions, and interactive activities on topics such as women's legal rights, health, education, and participation in community development. These initiatives encouraged the women to express their views, build self-confidence, and take an active role in their families and society. The gatherings were well received and contributed positively to the overall development and empowerment of the participants.



A social work programme was organised in Bongaigaon for tea garden workers, focusing on health awareness, social welfare schemes, education, and the overall well-being of workers and their families. The programme provided information on

government benefits and encouraged community participation to improve living and working conditions in the tea garden areas.

MEDICAL AID

Mr. Moreshwar Thakre, a poor farmer who also worked as a peon, was diagnosed with arthritis. The illness became so severe that he was confined to bed and was unable to



continue his work. As the sole breadwinner of his family, his inability to earn caused considerable financial and emotional hardship for the household.

He was admitted to a Patanjali Ayurvedic treatment centre, where he received the necessary medical care and therapy. The entire cost of his treatment was borne through charitable assistance. Owing to the treatment and proper care, Mr. Thakre's health has improved significantly. He is now able to resume his work and support his family once again, bringing renewed hope and stability to their lives.

Georgena, a student of Class XII, was diagnosed with a medical condition involving the accumulation of fluid in her abdomen, requiring prompt medical attention and treatment. Her father is a person with a disability, and her mother is the sole earning



member of the family. The cost of treatment placed a significant financial burden on the household. In view of their difficult circumstances, financial assistance was provided to support Georgena's medical care. This timely aid enabled her to receive the necessary treatment and brought much-needed relief and hope to the family during a challenging period.

Mr. Baliram, a skilled carpenter, met with a serious motorcycle accident in which his shoulder bone was severely crushed. The injury left him unable to work, rendering him temporarily jobless and causing considerable hardship for him and his family. Recognizing his urgent need for medical care, financial assistance was provided to cover the cost of his surgery. The timely support enabled him to undergo the necessary treatment and offered hope for his recovery and eventual return to his livelihood.



Mrs. Margaret George was diagnosed with cataracts, which significantly impaired her vision and made it difficult for her to carry out her daily household activities. As a homemaker, she depended on the modest income of her husband, who works as a peon, and the cost of surgery placed a considerable financial strain on the family. In response to their need, financial assistance was provided to cover the cost of her cataract surgery. The operation was successful, and Mrs. George has regained clear vision, enabling her to resume her daily activities with renewed confidence and happiness.

Mrs. Anjana Bundle was diagnosed with Stage III cancer. Coming from a financially disadvantaged family, she and her loved ones were unable to afford the cost of the chemotherapy required for her treatment. In view of their circumstances, financial assistance was provided to cover the



full cost of her chemotherapy. The timely support enabled her to continue her treatment and face the future with courage and hope. She remains under medical care and continues to look forward to a healthier and fulfilling life.

A village health outreach camp was held at Chicholi Village on Tuesday, 22 July 2025, from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. The medical team departed from the hospital at 8:55 a.m. and consisted of Dr. Jayant, a nurse, Sr. Priti, Roshan (Pharmacy), Ajay, and Chetan. The initiative was undertaken to provide primary medical care and raise awareness regarding preventive health practices among the villagers.
